"The God We Can Know"

The God We Can Know is our 6 week Lenten Bible Study based on the "I am" sayings of Jesus found in the Gospel of John. This series will help you find and form an answer to the most essential question in the Christian faith, "Who do you say I am?"

Fuquay and actually see the places where Jesus stood while disclosing his true identity, and in what context he spoke each "I Am." An Easter Message from Pastor John

When I finally reached the point where I was actually ready to give seminary a try, I made a visit to Chicago for a two-day recruitment affair hosted by the school. A goodly number of prospective students would be there and so they, along with me, would be treated to a taste of seminary life.

Most of my fellow inquirers were assigned to student housing, so I was a bit disappointed when I was yoked with a really, really old professor. As events of the first day wore down, the Rev. Dr. Joseph Sittler prepared to drive me to his, and his wife, Jeannie's apartment. The hour was late as Dr. Sittler and I headed out into the snow and cold of the February Chicago night.

I was nervous as I got into his car not just because I was going to be staying at a professor's house and he, essentially, a relative stranger to me. But I was also nervous because the aged Dr. Sittler had already retired from the University of Chicago before crossing the street to teach at the Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago, and because the dominant feature of his aged appearance was the eyeglasses upon his face. The lenses on the glasses he wore were the thickest I had ever seen! I don't' think I exaggerate any when I say that the fictional Mr. Magoo has nothing on old Dr. Sittler. (and, as an aside, by the beginning of my second year of seminary, Professor Sittler required a reader because he could no longer see print at all).

Somehow, (thank you, Jesus!) we arrived safely at the Sittler apartment. Joe & Jeannie, as I was encouraged to address them, were simply wonderful and delightful hosts. And, oh my goodness! The abundant works of art (Jeannie's profession) and the shelves upon shelves of books that walled their home was another sight I had never seen before and something truly remarkable to behold.

Well, as I learned from other people the following day, Dr. Sittler was a name that was world famous! I had no ideal! I thought he was a "mere" Lutheran seminary professor. But, on that day, I discovered that I had been hosted by a man who had set the theological world a-buzz when he presented a paper for the World Council of Churches as they met in New Delhi, India. (I suspect you can google this on the net if you want to pursue it further.)

In the four-volume set of <u>For All the Saints</u> which serves as my main devotional study/reading, there is a piece that Professor Sittler authored entitled, "Aging: A Summing Up and a Letting Go." As the Easter season will arrive at the end of the month, which makes what Joe this great man penned, very pertinent to the time – I'd like to share with you what Joe once write.

"If I were a young preacher again, I would preach the Christian gospel of eternal life in God, but I would preach it sooner in my ministry, preach it throughout, and I would preach it more realistically. The Bible really has nothing to say about eternal life. That sounds like a shocking statement, but it's literally true. There is not a single clear and concrete word in the Bible about life after death. It affirms that life with God is life with that which does not die. But any speculation about life after death is steadily avoided by the biblical writers.

"Paul made an effort to address the question, but it's a bum effort. 'What you sow does not come to life unless it dies. And what you sow is not the body, which is to be, by a bare kernel, perhaps of wheat or some other grain. But God gives it a body as he has chosen, and to each kind of seed its own body. For not all flesh is alike, but here is one kind for man, another for animals, another for birds. And another for fish! (1 Corinthians 15:36-39) He tries by natural analogy to say something. Interestingly, he never tried it again.

"In Romans, the most mature of Paul's epistles, he says, 'If we live, we live, to the Lord, and, if we die, we die to the Lord, so then whether we live or whether we die, we are the Lord's.' (Romans 14:8P) Period!

"That is the fundamental and absolute work of scripture. But that word is immensely satisfying to old people. I never try to give any blueprints of eternity or heaven or eternal life, since by definition it is utterly impossible. I think instead of trying to answer all the questions about death, we ought to follow the example of Paul and the New Testament and say, 'Eye has not seen nor ear heard', 'By faith we are saved,' (For <u>All The Saints</u>, Vol 1, pp.1059-1060)

"Whether we live or whether we die, we are the Lord's." Period!

Christ is Risen! He is Risen, indeed! Alleluia!!!

THE EASTER LILY

Christianity's most important holiday is rich in symbols, some secular, some religious, from the Easter bunny who brings treats and toys to children, to the Easter lily, a tall, stalky plant topped by graceful, trumpet-shaped blooms. But while the fragrant flower that fills churches and homes come Easter might seem simply a beautiful decoration welcoming springtime, over the course of its fascinating history it has come to feature a far deeper connotation. Today's Easter lily meaning is most commonly tied to the Bible and even Jesus Christ himself.

Long ago, pagans connected the plant with motherhood and fertility—there's a reason we give them as gifts to our moms as thanks for all that they do. There is even an ancient Greek myth which tells the tale of lilies blossoming from the milk of Hera, wife of Zeus. In Roman mythology, Venus, the goddess of love, was so envious of the lily's beauty and purity that she caused a giant pistil to sprout from its center. Cultures across the world still see lilies as symbols of virtue, hope, grace, and innocence.

While commercial bulb production of Easter lilies only began in the 19th century, lilies make many appearances in both the Old and New Testaments, emphasizing the flower's importance to Christianity. King Solomon spoke of them, and Christ referenced them, too. Mention of lilies in the Bible include:

"I will be like the dew to Israel; he will blossom like a lily. Like a cedar of Lebanon he will send down his roots" (Hosea 14:5).

"Consider how the lilies grow. They do not labor or spin. Yet I tell you, not even Solomon in all his splendor was dressed like one of these" (Luke 12:27).

Referred to as "white-robed apostles of hope," lilies are believed to have sprouted from the ground where Christ's blood and tears fell during crucifixion, as well as in the Garden of Gethsemane after his betrayal. It's also said they grew in the Garden of Eden from Eve's anguished tears. Because they represent purity, lilies are identified with the Virgin Mary, and in artworks_depicting the Annunciation to the Virgin they are often found in the angel Gabriel's hand. The flower is also associated with the saints Anthony of Padua and Catherine of Siena.

It's thought that Easter lilies came to symbolize Christ not only because they embody purity—the trumpet-shaped blooms recall the horns that heralded the resurrection of Christ. And the life cycle of Easter lilies, which grow from a bulb for several years beneath the earth before blossoming into magnificent flowers, recalls Jesus' death and resurrection. What other springtime flower could possibly represent Easter and Christ better?

Rebuilt Front Arches

Have you noticed !? Our 'decayed' front wood arches have been rebuilt with 8 foot tall block piers. Rebar and heavy steel angles are inside. Higher up, the curved arches are now clad with stucco. All amazing work by fantastic contractors. The block mason 'gifted' all costs. Blessed are we! The stucco work for the piers and arches cost \$ 1,850.00. Beautiful, difficult work.

Painting

Erik and Dave painted the block piers to match the Sanctuary. This brought to light a Council goal for many years to repaint the Sanctuary and Luther Hall exteriors for two main reasons. 1) Building protection. 2) Aesthetics. But, this never happened and is long past due. So, we contacted Jorge of Tasco Services, LLC and were quoted a super good price of \$ 9,170.00. We signed the contract not only for the great price but Jorge's past good paint work for us.

Color & Scope

How we wound up years ago with one color for the Sanctuary, and another for Luther Hall is unclear. Suffice to say they will now be the same color, as will be the back shed and front 'sign'. Rest assured there were 'lively' discussions as to what the new color should be! In the end, 'Pale Oak' for all walls (near same as Luther Hall now). And 'Bronzetone' for all trim, doors, and front arches (a dark color for sure).

The Luther Hall covered walkways and supports will NOT be painted, so poor is their condition. A repair project for another day.

Funding

At this time, we are drawing funds from our 'Property & Maintenance' budget since members themselves have done most all maintenance and repair work. Nevertheless, we do plan a fund-raising effort to replenish 'much as we can' to permit other upgrades such as new LH gutters. So, stay tuned!
